AN EPIC INTERVIEW

"At the Boys & Girls Clubs of Hutchinson I have found a place to work that champions the children of our community."

You've helped spark career interests in hundreds of teens. Do you have a favorite "ah-ha" moment?

Every business owner I have spoken to, without exception, supports soft (employability) skills development for their future employees. To address that concern, our school system and the Club collaborate to teach young people the skills needed to get and keep employment.

The EPIC Skillz position is becoming full-time. How do you hope to see EPIC continue to grow?

I hope that the EPIC Skillz program will serve as a model of how students learn and how the community can support "learning by doing." I hope that the program will grow "down" to support the career education work of the elementary schools and "up" to continue to involve students at the high school level. I hope that a strong EPIC Skillz internship model will be developed that will allow students to work and learn in area business and industry while still attending high school. I hope that those interns will be paid for positive participation and that through collaboration with the high school they will earn credit toward high school graduation.

USD 308 PARTNERSHIP

This summer, the relationship between the Club and USD 308 deepened as the two partnered to provide USD 308's Salthawk Summer Adventure Camp.

For six weeks, Faris Elementary School opened its doors four mornings per week to serve Faris students and Boys & Girls Club elementary-age members. Club Vision Leaders worked alongside USD 308 staff, serving as assistant teachers and lead teachers. By partnering with the Club, USD 308 reached more students this summer than they would have alone. The Club sent 274 elementary school members to participate in adventure camp.

"Once we got past the initial feeling of 'summer school' we have seen success," said Rachel Anderson, Director of Elementary Summer School for USD 308. "It was about engaging our kids again after a crazy year of COVID. We really wanted to ignite that spark—that love of learning—again with them. We've done projects and project-based learning...As I walk around, I see mysteries happening where they're solving crime scenes and using higher level thinking skills. I would say that our kids don't know that they're learning; they think they're having fun."

At Adventure Camp, rooms were broken out by grade, with special interest rooms focused on music, art and STEM. The curriculum for the elementary

camp was based on Summer Brain Gain, a program from Boys & Girls Clubs of America that focuses on keeping youth's academic skills sharp through engaging, hands-on learning. Each module integrates social-emotional learning and is aligned with the common core.

"It's been really good for the kids to have separation between programming and Boys & Girls Club fun," said Amy Taylor, 6th grade lead teacher. Taylor has worked for the Club for 26 years and is a pre-school teacher at USD 308 during the school year. "Students have still had fun and they've learned a lot and been engaged. The summer camp is at the school, but they go to Boys & Girls Club in the afternoon. It's the best of both worlds, I think."

According to the Review of Educational Research, <u>during the summer most</u> youth lose approximately two months of math skills and low-income youth also lose two months in reading achievement. Preventing summer learning loss is always important, especially for lower-income children. High-quality summer enrichment has been especially important this year as schools and community organizations work to offset the COVID-19 pandemic's impacts on education.

"I'm very thankful that the school district and the Boys & Girls Club can work together to provide this opportunity to our youth," said Lance Patterson, Director of Operations at the Boys & Girls Clubs of Hutchinson. "The pandemic was incredibly difficult for our students and our families. Being able to bring them together in one place, surrounded by caring adults, is really beneficial to the kids and their social emotional wellbeing, but also to the teachers and getting them reengaged with the fun of education. Hopefully, we've been able to accomplish those two things this summer."

This summer partnership may not be over yet.

"I hope that this isn't just a COVID happening," said Anderson. "I hope this is something that we can continue to look at in the years to come. We have built a bridge with the Club and in turn I think we are reaching the community...I really hope that this continues because I believe that it's been a good thing, but when you hear other people talking about how it's been successful—how we have reached the kids and how they hope that we continue doing this—then you know that things have been working."

In 2021 the Club began a partnership with the Reno County Sheriff's Office. Officers drop in to hang out and to take part in Club activities with youth.

"We see this as a great opportunity for our Club members to develop positive relationships with local law enforcement," said Lance Patterson, Director of Operations for the Boys & Girls Clubs of Hutchinson. "We know kids from all backgrounds have the potential to have one or more adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) while they're growing up. Those ACEs can cause lifelong impacts to health. The best way to help kids build resilience is to surround them with caring adults. Working with the sheriff's office is a way to add one more set of caring adults into their lives—people Club members know they can turn to with questions or for help."

The Club hopes that Club members' engagement with law enforcement will be a step in building mutual trust in our community.

"I'm excited for our officers to interact with the kids—show them we're like them. We're good guys and we're here for them," said Deputy Matt Vieyra, a board member for the Boys & Girls Club. "We're excited to connect with the kids and learn more about what interests them."
